



## Patriot Pride Award Requirements

### 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade

The Patriot Pride award is designed to challenge students. These goals are centered on developing strong academic and citizenship skills within our students. Students will choose 8 goals that they would like to work on throughout the school year; 4 must be from the patriotic category and 4 from the other. These goals can be worked on in the home and at school but must be quality work or it will not be accepted. The teacher or the parent can initial each goal as it is passed off. At the end of the year if their 8 goals have been completed, the student will be recognized for their accomplishment in our end of year assembly. This sheet must be initialled and returned by **Friday, May 14, 2021**.

#### Patriotic Pride (Choose 4)

1. Research an American Hero and put together a nonfiction book with text features.
2. Write your own patriotic song or poem and create a visual to accompany it.
3. Recreate through video an American historical event.
4. Memorize the Presidents' full names in order.
5. Interview a community helper (policeman, fireman, etc.) report what 3rd graders can do to make the community better or to help the community helpers and present findings in class.
6. Write a persuasive letter to a local, state or national government official suggesting a positive change and why they should do it.
7. Research the history of the Pledge of Allegiance. When was it written? Who wrote it? What does it mean? What does each word mean? Write your own pledge of allegiance.

#### Other Goals (Choose 4)

1. Construct an invention to solve a problem in your daily life. Write a report on how it will influence your life and others. Have a display of your creation process. Be prepared to share with your class.
2. Create a 3D model of a life cycle with a written explanation and parts clearly labeled.
3. Video tape yourself reading a picture book with good fluency and expression.
4. Spend at least 150 minutes at a hospital or nursing home and reading, playing games, or spending time with a patient or resident. Have one journal account per visit of what you did, how you felt, what was the effect of your visit on you and the person you visited?
5. Research hazardous weather in our area and create an emergency preparedness kit for your family. Include a list of items. Bring it to show your teacher.
6. Keep a food log for a month and graph the amount of fruits and vegetables eaten per day.
7. Memorize multiplication and division math facts up to 20 times 12 tested in front of the class.
